

FREDERIC M. SCHERER

F. M. Scherer is Aetna Professor Emeritus at the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University. He has also taught at Princeton University, the University of Michigan, Northwestern University, Swarthmore College, the Central European University, and the University of Bayreuth. In 1974-76, he was chief economist at the Federal Trade Commission. His undergraduate degree was from the University of Michigan; he received his M.B.A. and Ph.D. from Harvard University; he holds an honorary doctorate from the University of Hohenheim, Germany.

His research specialties are industrial economics and the economics of technological change, leading inter alia to books on *Industrial Market Structure and Economic Performance* (third edition with David Ross); *The Economics of Multi-Plant Operation: An International Comparisons Study* (with three co-authors); *International High-Technology Competition*; *Competition Policies for an Integrated World Economy*; *Mergers, Sell-offs, and Economic Efficiency* (with David J. Ravenscraft); *Innovation and Growth: Schumpeterian Perspectives*; *The Weapons Acquisition Process* (two volumes, one with M. J. Peck); *Industry Structure, Strategy, and Public Policy*; and *New Perspectives on Economic Growth and Technological Innovation*.

His current research is on the economics of musical composition between the years 1650 and 1900. He is past president of the Industrial Organization Society and the International Joseph A. Schumpeter Society, and past vice president of the American Economic Association and the Southern Economic Association.
