
There was an article published in our local newspaper addressing the issue of telemarketers and their intrusions upon citizens. It was suggested that we write you with comment on this issue.





Gentlemen:



Dear Sir:

The following are brief comments and observations regarding the subject matter and in support of establishing such a regulation:

- 1 - Frequently telemarketers are the cause of problems **for** senior citizens and invalid personnel because of their many calls at inappropriate times of day and evening and do **not** take action to remove telephone numbers when requested because there is no "real" penalty if they do not comply.
- 2 - Some telemarketers do not comply with current state and federal regulations prohibiting telephone calls at certain times of the day and night.
- 3 - Some consumers subscribe to Caller ID Service to screen out commercial calls but some telemarketers (majority) use automatic dialers and computers which do not list the telephone number on the Caller ID.
- 4 - Those telemarketers that use automatic dialers and **dial** multiple numbers at once resulting in consumers answering a "dead line" which is very frustrating and causes "fear" and other problems **for** some elderly persons.
- 5 - The fact that a telemarketer's identity is hidden electronically, causes some to be abusive-persistent, and vindictive when a consumer rejects their call.

The aforementioned problems with telemarketers is only a small portion of problems and aggravation encountered by consumers, We have made a study of consumers in the Philadelphia Metropolitan Area and find that between 78% to 92% of all calls consumers with Caller IDs receive list the telemarketers telephone number as "OUT OF AREA". Thus they are paying the Verizon telephone company for a service that only provides between 8% to 22% Caller ID service,


We have also found that between 43% to 58% of telemarketers misrepresent their call and their firm by stating that it is merely a "courtesy call" or and "information" call which some consumers do not comprehend and know how to respond to avoid future calls.

We strongly urge the adoption of regulations requiring all telemarketers to not block their telephone numbers so that those that have Caller IDs can trace offenders and file complaints and those that do not have the Caller IDs can utilize the telephone companies facilities for tracing calls by using their "call back" dialing features. This regulation is urged because a number of the senior citizens that participated in our research group encountered abusive telemarketers that when'rebuffed and told not to call again, they made several calls to the same number the same and later days and harassed the consumer. The consumers could not file complaints against the illegal callers because they blocked their numbers,

We have heard that the telemarketer's defense against the proposed National List is that it violates their constitutional right of "free speech", That is bogus, this constitutional right ends when the telephone line reaches the residence.
