Dear Chairman Leibowitz:

On December 8, 2011, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) held a workshop titled, "Face Facts: A Forum on Facial Recognition Technology."¹ The FTC's workshop explored facial recognition and detection technologies, as they relate to consumer privacy in the commercial sector, and sought to educate the public on how these technologies are being used. As members of the Congressional Bi-Partisan Privacy Caucus, we agree that these technologies raise a number of privacy concerns and deserve thoughtful oversight.

Currently, there are a number of companies that have implemented both facial recognition and facial detection technologies for the stated purpose of enhancing the user experience. We are deeply concerned about how the use of these technologies impact the level of protection for consumer's personal information.


As companies continue to develop and deploy these new technologies, clear policies guiding the implementation, operation, and maintenance of these technologies are essential. Companies must also be transparent about the usage of consumer's personal information. Finally, consumers should have the choice to affirmatively opt-in to being subject to facial recognition or detection.






