# **Speaker Biographies**

# **Keith Agisim**

Keith Agisim is Associate General Counsel for Global Intellectual Property for Bank of America. He is also a past chair of the Patent Committee of the Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America (PhRMA), the National Council of Intellectual Property Law Associations (NCIPLA),

the Intellectual Property Committee of the National Association of Manufacturers (NAM), the Fellows of the American Intellectual Property Law Association, and the Intellectual Property Law Section of the State Bar of Michigan.

Mr. Armitage has served as an Adjunct Professor of Law at George Washington University, as a member of the board of directors of Human Genome Sciences, Inc., and as President of the Board of Directors of the Hospice of Southwest Michigan, Inc. He also has served as a member of the Board of Directors of both Intellectual Property Owners (IPO) and the National Inventors Hall of Fame Foundation (NIHFF). He currently is serving as a member of the Council for the Intellectual Property Law Section of the American Bar Association (ABA IPL Section), a member of the Board of Directors of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, a member of the Greater Indianapolis Progress Committee and the Indianapolis Race Relations Leadership Network, and a trustee on the Albion College Board of Trustees.

# George E. Badenoch

From 1994-2005, he taught at the University of Florida College of Law, where he held a University of Florida Research Foundation Professorship and directed the school's Intellectual Property Law Program. From 2005-06, he was a Professor of Law at Washington and Lee University School of Law.

Professor Cotter's principal research and teaching interests are in the fields of domestic and international intellectual property law, antitrust, and law and economics. He is the coauthor, with Roger D. Blair, of *Intellectual Property: Economic and Legal Dimensions of Rights and Remedies*, published by Cambridge University Press in 2005. He has authored or coauthored over 30 other scholarly works, including articles in the *California Law Review*, the *Georgetown Law Journal*, the *Iowa Law Review*, the *Minnesota Law Review*, the *University of Illinois Law Review*, the *William & Mary Law Review*, the *North Carolina Law Review*, the *Notre Dame Law Review*, and the *Tulane Law Review*.

### John M. Golden

John Golden is an Assistant Professor at the University of Texas School of Law, where he teaches patent law and administrative law. Prior to joining the School of Law, Professor Golden worked as an associate in the intellectual property department of Wilmer Cutler Pickering Hale and Dorr LLP, and taught patent law as a lecturer at Harvard Law School in 2004 and 2005. Professor Golden clerked for Associate Justice Stephen Breyer of the United States Supreme Court during the Court's October 2002 term, and clerked for the Honorable Michael Boudin of the United States Court of Appeals for the First Circuit from June of 2000 to June of 2001. He obtained a J.D. from Harvard Law School in 2000, a Ph.D. in physics from Harvard University in 1997, and an A.B. in physics and history from Harvard College in 1992.

# Paul M. Janicke

Paul Janicke is the HIPLA Professor of Law at the University of Houston Law Center, where he has taught since 1992. Prior to that he was a senior litigation partner in Arnold, White & Durkee, where he practiced for twenty-one years.

Professor Janicke teaches evidence, patent law, patent litigation, licensing, and an introductory survey of Intellectual property law. He is a founder of the Law Center's Institute for Intellectual Property & Information Law, which has been ranked among the top ten Intellectual property law programs in the United States by *U.S. News & World Report* for each of the last twelve years.

He has authored numerous published articles on Intellectual property subjects, and a casebook, *Modern Patent Litigation*, published by Carolina Academic Press, now in its second edition.

Professor Janicke's research activities are primarily empirical patent law studies, including the web service patstats.org and other statistical analyses of developments within the patent system. He is a frequent speaker at gatherings of lawyers and judges.

Mr. Johnson has served as trial counsel in over 100 patent cases, including over 50 resulting in reported decisions of the federal district courts and/or of the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals.

Mr. Johnson is a frequent speaker, and has testified before both the House and Senate Judiciary Committees on the subject of patent law reform. He received his B.S. degree, *cum laude*, with distinction in biology from Bucknell University and his J.D. degree from Harvard Law School, where his third year advisor was now-Supreme Court Justice Stephen Breyer.

Merrill). He is the co-editor of the Research Handbook on the Economics of Property Law (with Kenneth Ayotte, forthcoming 2009). Professor Smith holds an A.B. from Harvard, a Ph.D. in Linguistics from Stanford, and a J.D. from Yale. In 2003, he was awarded a Berlin Prize Fellowship by the American Academy in Berlin.
