Re: Identity Theft Targeting Senior Citizens

## Research into the problem shows:

- 1. The scammers capture personal and social information of a grandson or nephew from Facebook.
- 2. The scammer captures the "voice" of the grandson or nephew and finds another scammer who can duplicate the voice.
- 3. The grandparents are called and told of a car accident involving their loved on in a foreign country. "Please wire money to get the loved one out of jail." The next day there is a request for money to repair the car.
- 4. The grandparents wire the money through Western Union.

Victims have contacted Lifespan, a non-profit agency dedicated to helping older adults take on the challenges and opportunities of longer life, in hopes of recovering their money. Unfortunately there is no chance of recovery. Requests to Western Union by Lifespan on behalf of the consumer for copies of the signature and of the identification of the individual picking up the funds are unsuccessful. Western Union will only release this information to law enforcement. Lifespan has forwarded information on two specific cases to a New York State police investigator to obtain the above requested information from Western Union. Western Union responded with a request for a subpoena. Unfortunately law enforcement does not have the time or manpower to enforce these subpoenas.

Legislation should be enacted to allow consumers who have been scammed out of thousands of dollars to request and receive a copy of the signature and identification of the individual collecting the funds wired to Western Union without such difficulty.
