Dear Ms. Louis:

This is in partial response to your request dated June 17, 2016 under the Freedom of Information Act seeking access to consumer complaints from March 1, 2016 to present for T-Mobile, Verizon, AT&T, and Sprint under certain product codes. In accordance with the FOIA and agency policy, we have searched our records as of June 17, 2016, the date we received your request in our FOIA office.

The Commission's fee regulations specify that fees less than \$25 will be waived. See 16 C.F.R. § 4.8(b)(4). Because the fees associated with the processing of your request did not exceed \$25, we have processed your request free of charge.

This release concerns the complaints covering Verizon, Sprint, and AT&T. The complaints covering T-Mobile will be sent out within one week.

We have located approximately 6,500 responsive complaints that consumers have made to the Federal Trade Commission ("FTC"). You should know that the enclosed complaints have not necessarily been verified by the FTC. Therefore, you should make your own judgment about relying on the information provided. I am denying access to consumers' names and addresses, and any other identifying information found in the complaints. This information is exempt from release under FOIA Exemption 6, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6), because individuals' right to privacy outweighs the general public's interest in seeing personal identifying information. See The Lakin Law Firm v. FTC, 352 F.3d 1122 (7th Cir. 2003).

If you are not satisfied with this response to your request, you may appeal by writing to Freedom of Information Act Appeal, Office of the General Counsel, Federal Trade Commission, 600 Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20580, within 90 days of the date of this letter. Please enclose a copy of your original request and a copy of this response. If you believe that we should choose to disclose additional materials beyond what the FOIA requires, please explain why this would be in the public interest.
