To Whom It May Concern:

Please, do not put E15 on the market. Putting more fuel blends out there is not going to solve problems it will create them. Pumps already have three ranges of "gasoline" with octane ratings from 86 to 93. There are also E85 and diesel pumps. More pumps equals more confusion.

The proposed rule to prevent inadvertent E15 use provides no direction on where on the pump the label should be located. Moreover, the FTC is proposing that the label be rounded to the nearest factor of 10. How will this accurately inform the consumer of the type of fuel called for by the vehicle owner's manual? Will a fuel containing 11 percent to 14 percent ethanol be labeled as 10 percent ethanol? Is the FTC aware that manufacturers' warranties are valid only for the use of fuel containing 10 percent ethanol by volume or less?
